My Grandy & self are likewise in unusual health.

I am working at present at the Carpenter's Trade. I have not much news to write. The weather has been very mild this Spring until lately we are getting some pretty hard frosts, killing the Fruit to a considerable extent. Farmers are planting their Corn nowadays.

A man living about a mile from Rowanda by the name of Dudson, hung himself on Friday of last week. He went out to his Barn to take care of his Horses as usual in the morning; & was found dead, having hung himself with a strap from the harness. He was a man highly esteemed & no other reason ascribed for his Act only that he was fearful his Family might come to want. Rather a novel way of providing for ones family.
