We have had quite a
dry Summer here, until within
a few days past, smart
showers have revived up

things very much.
Corn will yet be good
but the Potatoe crop
has been materially damaged
by the drought.

Farming will pay better
this season than for a
few years past, as everything
bears a better price.

It is tolerably healthy here
at present. The Small
Pox is over with. There
were about a dozen
cases, two of which
were fatal.

Religious matters are rather
on the decline in the
here now, but I lean
upon any but preaching meetings
My own religious enjoyments
