Dear Father.

I improve the present by writing a few lines to let you know we are in usual health &c. We are getting very pleasant weather nowadays; have had no frost yet. & Mosquitoes are so numerous as to be quite troublesome. People are still busily engaged cutting Hay, & will be for some time. The Crops here are very good, Wheat & Oats rather an extra yield & Corn has matured & out of danger from frost. A good deal of Sugar Cane is raised & the Mills are at work here and there over the Prairie in almost every neighborhood.

We have very good meetings  
here now.  
Call Glenn I don't know  
or I shall be able to  
pay back the \$20 he  
sent me, this fall, but  
intended to do so before  
now. There are a great  
many ways for a fellow  
earlins, to go in a  
new country, as well  
as elsewhere. I have  
not yet succeeded in  
laying up enough  
to buy a cow, but am  
looking for more  
prosperous days ahead.

Time will doubtless make  
a fine country of this,  
or rather it will be  
made so in time.  
Emigrants are still com-  
ing in on westward a  
hundred miles beyond us.

as good may from  
Wisconsin & some from  
the New England States.  
It is rather questionable  
if this makes a good  
fruit country. Some  
grow very well  
until 5 or 6 years old  
& then die down.

Small fruits such as Currants,  
Raspberries & Strawberries  
do well.
